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J.R.R. Tolkien completed his translation of Beowulf in 1926: he returned to it later to make hasty corrections, but seems never to have considered its publication. This edition includes an illuminating written commentary on the poem by the translator himself, drawn from a series of lectures he gave at Oxford in the 1930s.

In this volume, Christopher Tolkien edits his father's translation of "Beowulf" together with a commentary composed of J.R.R. Tolkien's lectures on the text along with "Sellic Spell," "an imagined story of Beowulf in an early form" and Tolkien's "Lay of Beowulf," "a rendering of the story in the form of a ballad to be sung" (pg. xiii).

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
